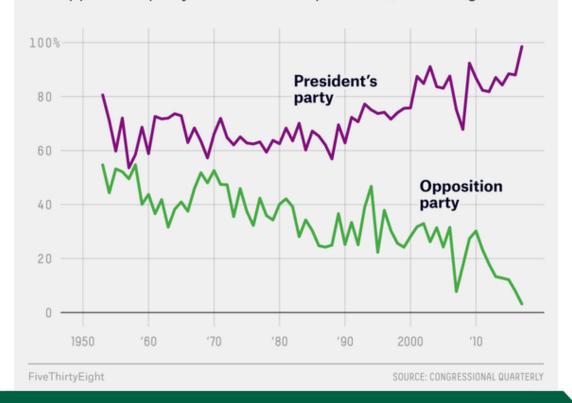

Dems 2010 Health Care

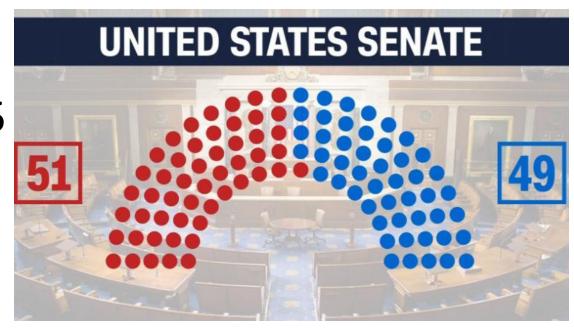

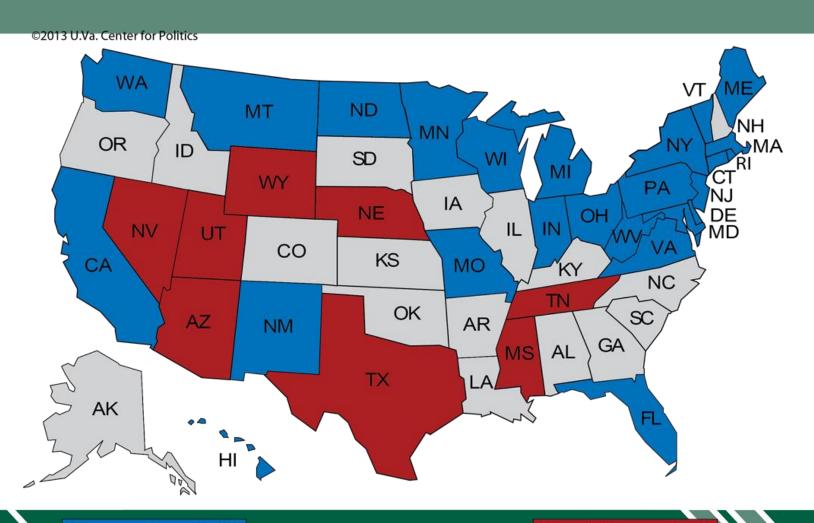
Infrastructure Bills Can be Bipartisan

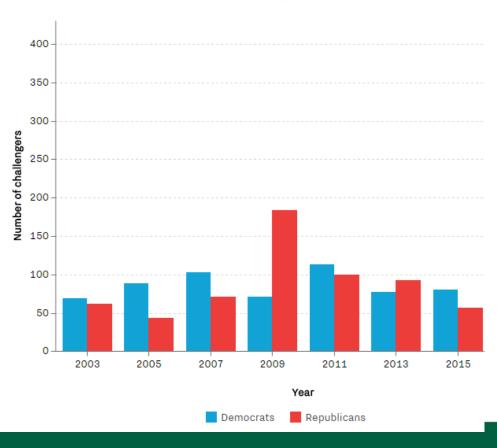


Democratic seats: 25

Challengers to House Incumbents

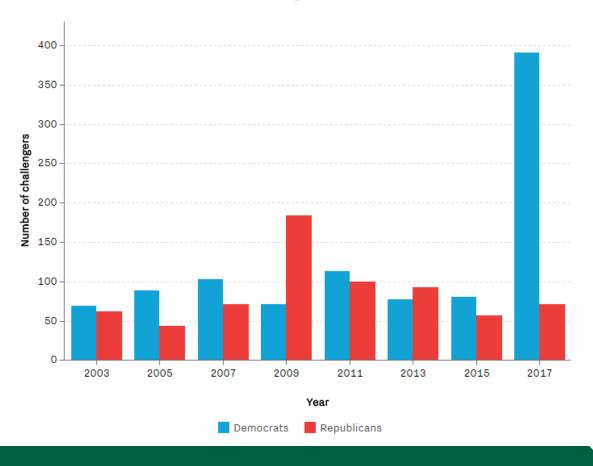
Number of House challengers who have raised over \$5,000 as of Sept. 30

Tax Reform Recap

Tax Reform Recap

- Tax reform bill signed on December 22, 2017
- Preserves Municipal Bonds, but eliminates the ability to advance refund
- Preserves Private Activity Bonds (PABs) (House bill would have eliminated)
- Preserves commuter tax benefit for both transit and parking, but prevents companies from deducting the cost of providing the benefit as a business expense

Tax Reform Recap

- Does not subject certain investments by state and local government pension plans to the unrelated business income tax (proposed in the House bill)
- Does not fix the Highway Trust Fund

President's Budget

Trump Budget

- Fully funds Highway Trust Fund programs during the FAST Act – major cuts after 2020
- Again proposes phasing out the Capital Investment Grants (CIG) program
- Amtrak would receive \$738 million, as compared to \$1.495 billion enacted in 2017
- No funding for new FAST rail programs
- Eliminate TIGER
- Grants to WMATA are cut

FY18 and FY19 Appropriations

Appropriations

- Congress passed a continuing resolution (CR) to reopen the federal government and keep it funded through March 23, 2018
- Avoids sequestration. Raise the spending caps by about \$300 billion over two years
- Nondefense spending increases by \$63 billion this year and \$68 billion next year
- Promise of \$10 billion each year for broad infrastructure spending

Appropriations

- APTA is advocating for increased funding for:
 - Bus and rail state-of-good repair
 - Rail grants including for Positive Train Control
 - Research, technical assistance, workforce development
 - Capital Investment Grants (CIG)
- Statutory language requiring DOT to advance CIG project agreements

Infrastructure Initiative

Trump Infrastructure Plan

- \$100 billion for a new "incentive grants" program that favors project sponsors that dedicate new, non-federal revenue streams to infrastructure
- \$50 billion for grants to rural areas
- \$20 billion for a new "transformative projects" program led by the Commerce Department
- \$14 billion for existing federal credit programs including TIFIA and RRIF
- \$6 billion to support expanded and increased Private Activity Bonds
- \$10 billion for federal real estate purchases
- Elimination of regulatory barriers and permitting streamlining
- Reform of workforce development programs

Trump Infrastructure Plan

- Require Value Capture Financing as Condition of Receipt of Transit Funds for Capital Investment Grants
- Eliminate Constraints on Use of Public-Private and Public-Public Partnerships in Transit
- Codify Expedited Project Delivery for Capital Investment Grants Pilot Program

How Will This Be Paid For?

- Deficit spending? Tax reform bill increased the debt by \$1.5 trillion.
- Cuts to other programs, including transportation?
- Gas tax has not been increased since 1993.
- Tolls, Vehicle Miles Travelled (VMT) or others?

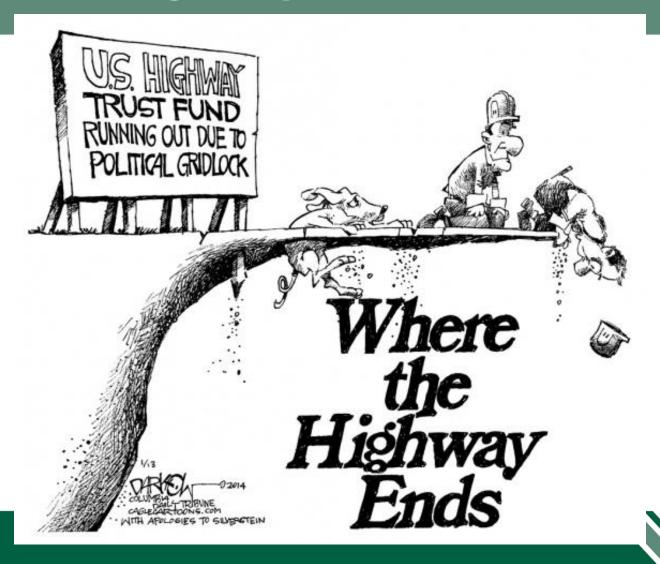
