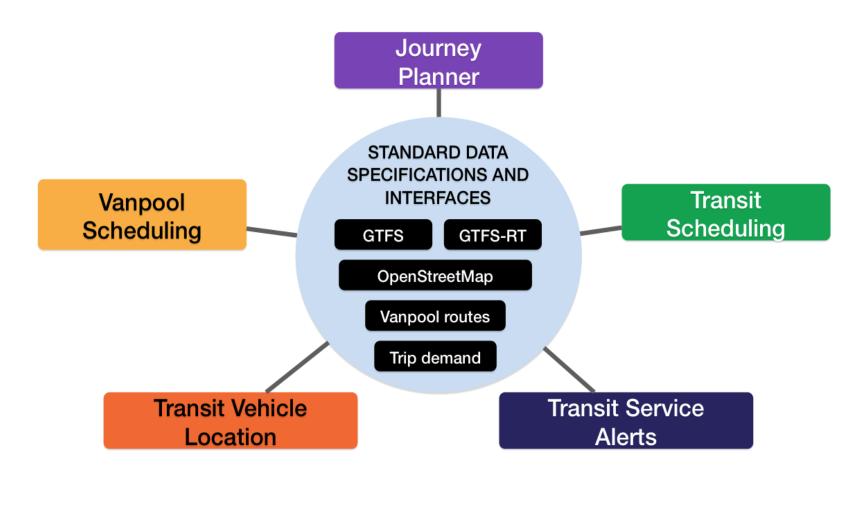

- Open-source community (Partnership Driven, Innovative Business Model)

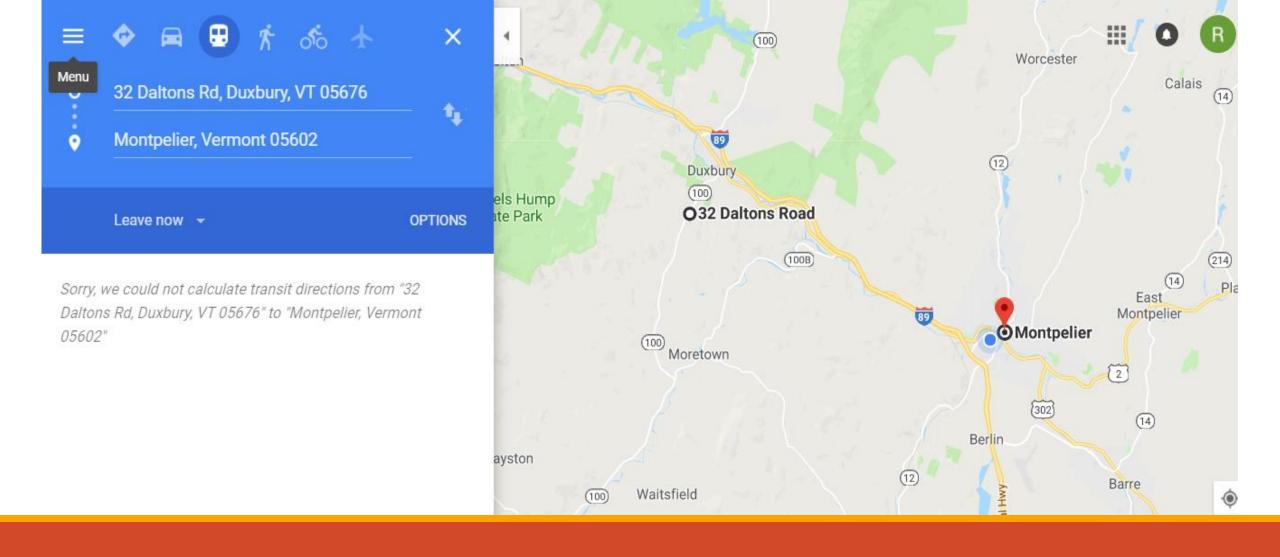

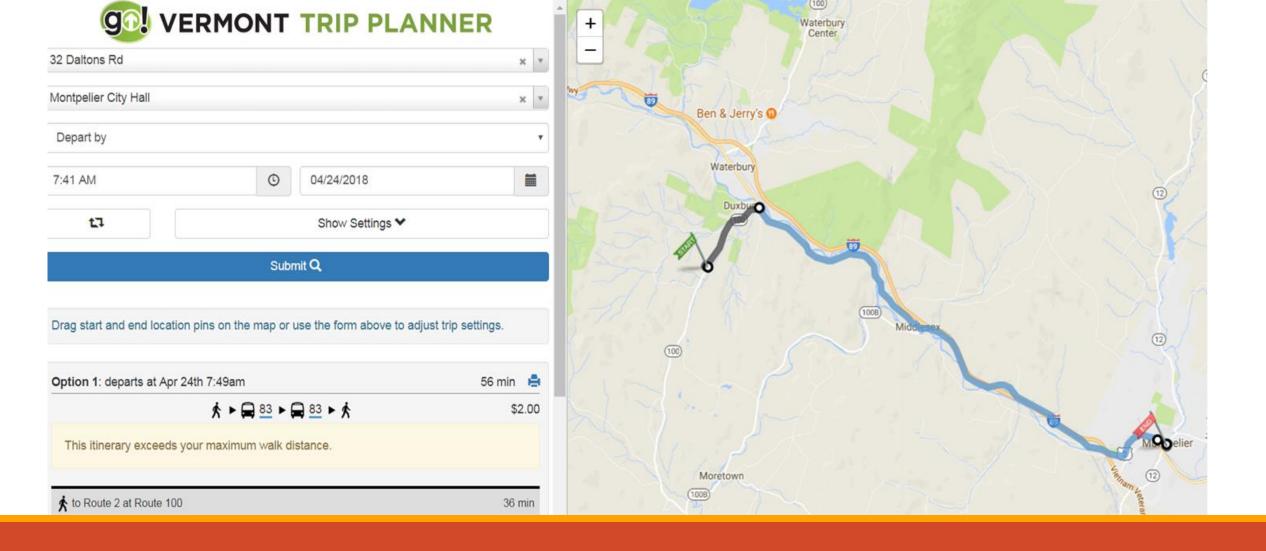

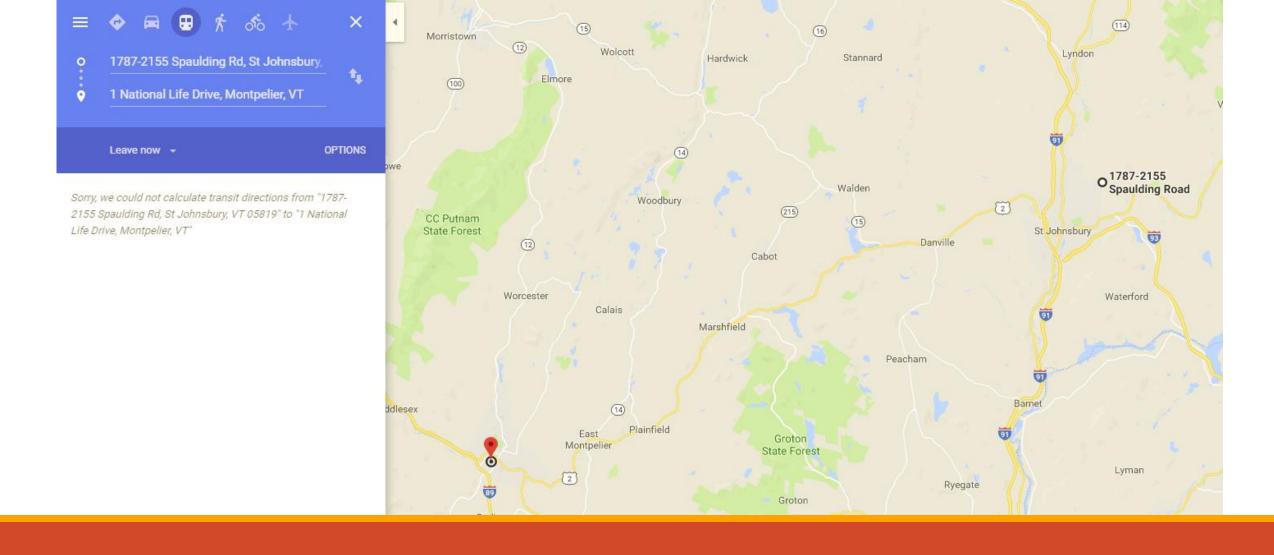
Current Google Maps Trip Results





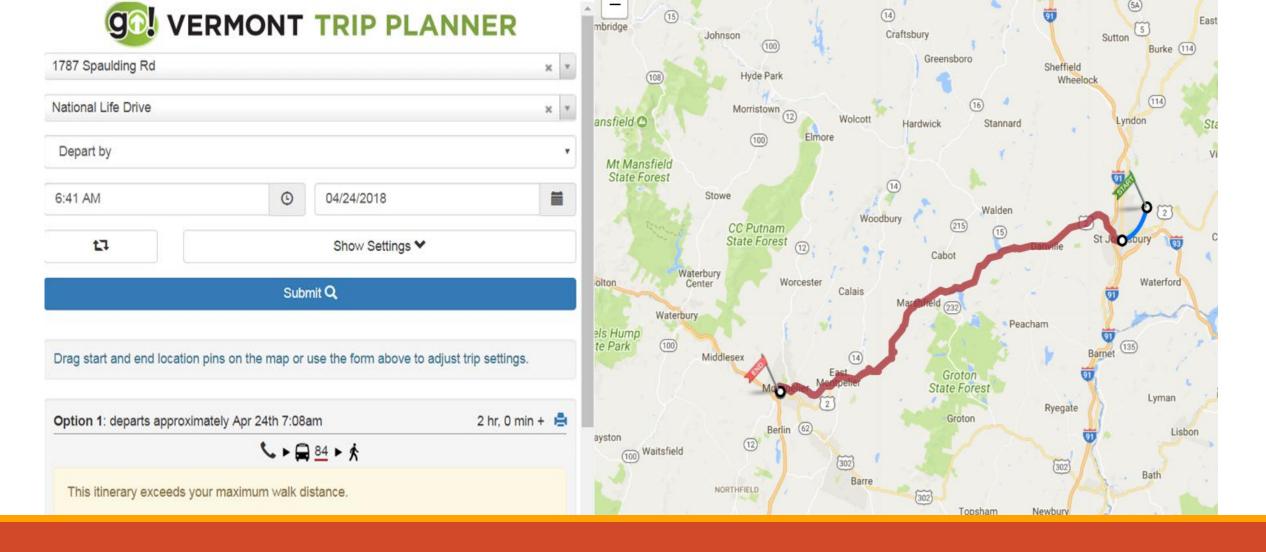
GO! Vermont Trip Planner Results





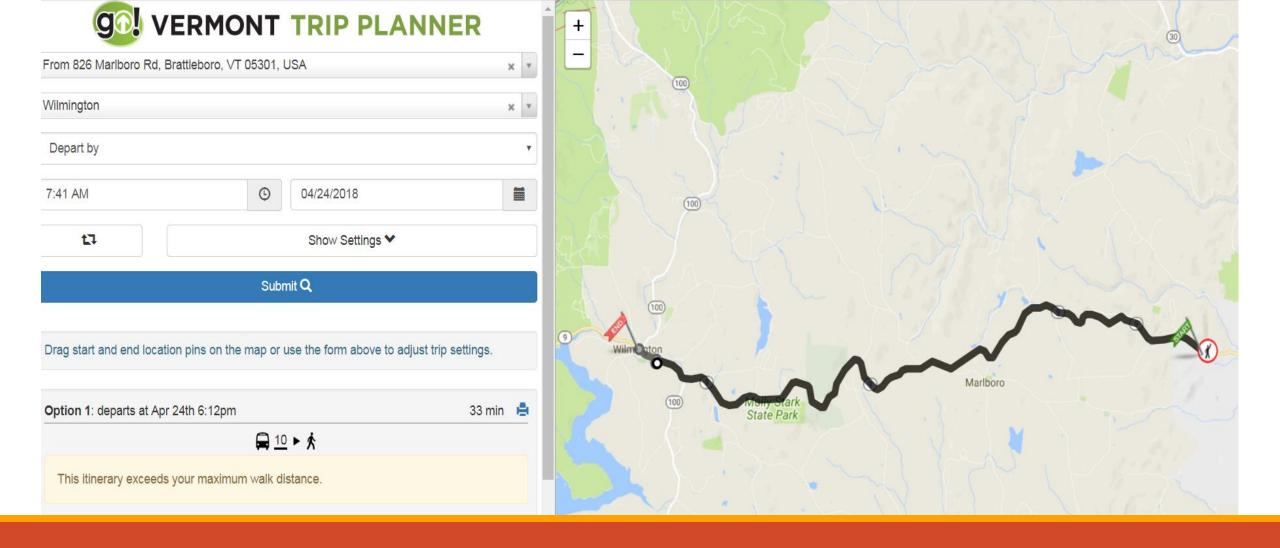
Current Google Trip Planner

RESULTS

- Over 1,000 users during the initial pilot phase.
- •Surveys: two separate surveys, provider, and riders). Initial to establish baseline, then annual follow-ups planned. Tracking usage, user experience and usefulness.
- •Google analytics show more than 15% of visitors to the Go Vermont site are using the Trip Planner.
- Statewide Ad and Outreach Campaign to begin in September.



The Message

GETTING AROUND VERMONT BE HARD YO!

This video introduces Dale. Dale is a loveable and enthusiastic dude who knows how to link all his travel options together. Why? Because Dale loves rollerblading around Vermont, but "getting places in Vermont on rollerblades be hard yo!"

Dale knows how to connect all his travel options into one seamless trip, because he's learned the hard way. He's stoked to show you how the Go! Vermont Trip Planner works.

In the video, Dale is rollerblading on a back country road / Vermont setting (barns, mountains, etc.). He's grooving, pivoting, laying down moves, and explaining the righteous virtues of the Go! Vermont Trip Planner, and how it works.

He explains the fact that it connects all of your options – local options that "the big search engines don't even know about because they're made out in California or some fancy place where it doesn't even snow."

We follow Dale back to his house, where we see him kick back with his rollerblades on. He gets on his oldschool desktop computer and begins to use the Go! Vermont Trip Planner. He types in some addresses, so we can see a point A to point B route. From there, Dale shows us his screen and how easy it is to use the trip planning tool to plan all of his rad trips - like getting to job interviews, the hospital, or most importantly, his Grammy's.

We cut back to Dale getting on the bus with his rollerblades, and we follow him to his final destination. Throughout the video, Dale is perfectly out-of-place in his rollerblades and wardrobe.

CONCEPT NOTES: Dale takes potentially dry information and relays it in a super easy-to-understand way. He's memorable, funny, and empowering. After all, if Dale can figure out the Go! Vermont Trip Planner, so can you!

VIDEO DURATION: 1-:60 spot, with a :30 cut that focus primarily on the instructional aspect of using the tool (at his house).
